So-Cal dance events this week include tough subjects and world dance in Santa Monica, 18th century ballet style and contemporary choreographers downtown, a series reboot at a Glendale library, and an early look at new works in Lincoln Heights.

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2. Real time dance

Dance seldom emerges in a final form first time out, usually evolving as a choreographer actually sees the work performed through the filters of real time dancing and audience reaction. *Incubation: A Choreographers' Showcase* is **LA Contemporary Dance Company**'s chance for choreographers and audiences to test run several new and in progress dances before their final form next season. The impressive line up of dance makers includes Nathan Makolandra, Rebecca Lemme, Nicolas Heitzeberg and former LACDC director Kate Hutter, plus original music from LA-based composer Jodie Landau of Wild Up. 1. Nestled against the mountains

Dance at the Brand is a long-running dance series that has been a bit of a local secret for fans who enjoy performance in a picture perfect library nestled against the San Gabriel Mountains. Recently award-winning festival producer Jamie Nichols was recruited to oversee the series and the reboot made its debut last week with the inventive Invertigo Dance Theater. This week the all female troupe **Szalt** transposes *WaterStories* from its original art gallery venue to the library's pastoral environs. In June the series closes with the exuberant Viver Brasil.
